Stephen M. Walt is the Robert and Renée Belfer Professor of International Affairs at the Harvard Kennedy School, Harvard University. He is a contributing editor at *Foreign Policy*, co-editor of the *Cornell Studies in Security Affairs*, and was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in May 2005. He received the International Studies Association's Distinguished Senior Scholar award in 2014.

His writings include *The Origins of Alliances* (1987), *Revolution and War* (1996), *Taming American Power: The Global Response to U.S. Primacy*, and *The Israel Lobby and U.S. Foreign Policy* (co-authored with John J. Mearsheimer, 2007). His latest book is *The Hell of Good Intentions: America's Foreign Policy Elite and the Decline of U.S. Primacy* (2018).

Closing Keynote Address by Professor Bina D'Costa

Where Exactly am I Sitting at that Table? Race, Prejudice and Perpetual (In)Security in International Relations

Bina D'Costa is a Professor in the Department of International Relations, Coral Bell School of Asia Pacific Affairs at the Australian National University (ANU). She was also the inaugural Associate Dean (IDEA-Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access) for the ANU College of Asia and the Pacific. Her publications include *Nationbuilding*, *Gender and War Crimes in South Asia* (2011), *Children and the Politics of Violence* (2017) and *Cascades of Violence* (co-authored with John Braithwaite, 2018).

Bina has worked as a senior UN staff member, most recently at UNICEF to build its Migration and Displacement program at the Office of Research-Innocenti. As a frontline researcher and humanitarian practitioner, she has contributed to Europe's and Horn of Africa's refugee emergencies and served in the UN Rohingya Emergency Response Team in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. She has provided inputs and technical advice to transitional justice processes including witness protection and victim support mechanisms at the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda (ICTR), Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), International Crimes Tribunal, Bangladesh, and civil society transitional justice initiatives in Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Cambodia.

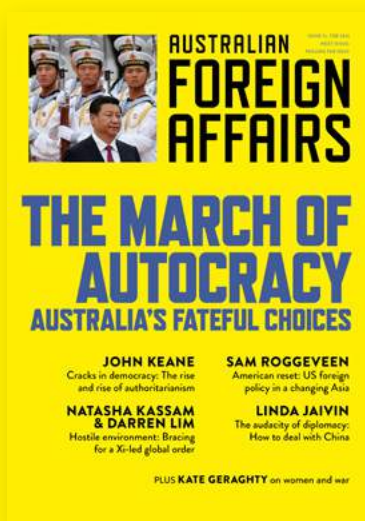

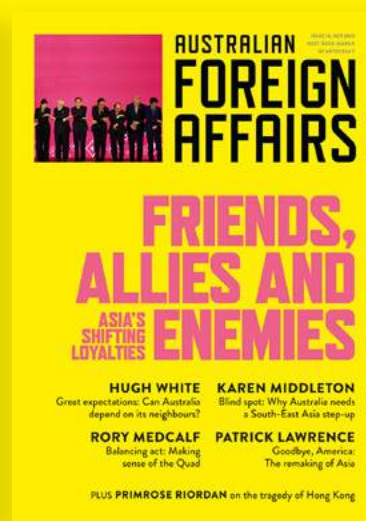

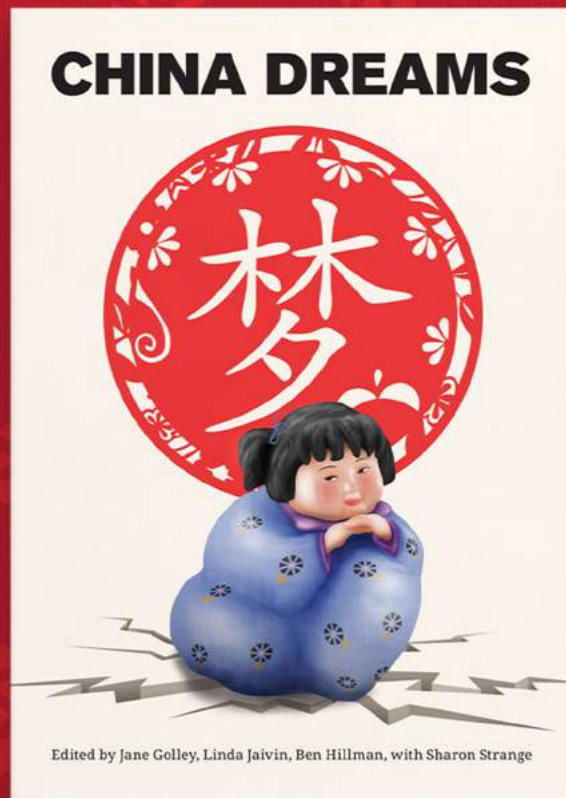
